Reading and speaking Gagana Samoa

The core Samoan alphabet is comprised of 14 letters:

The consonants (konesane):

F, G, L, M, N, P, S, T and V

The vowels (vaueli):

A, E, I, O and **U** (as in the English language: **a**re, th**e**re, thr**ee**, **o**r, t**oo**).

These vowels have the same pronunciation as other Pacific languages, including te reo Māori (Māori language).

The letters **K**, **H** and **R** are also used, but usually for foreign loanwords and/ or for colloquial language. Vowels can be long or short.

Kirikiti Cricket Rāpiti Rabbit

Long vowels are marked with a macron (e.g. ā).

ā, ē, ī, ō, ū

(as in the English language: father, egg, feet, thought, loot)

It is important that the short and long vowel sounds are used, as they distinguish between different words e.g. ava (respect) verses āvā (wife).

The glottal stop (') is also used in Samoan and is treated as a consonant. It creates a pause between two vowels or creates a sharper sound when used at the start of a word, as the sound made in the English word uh-oh. Using the glottal stop, distinguishes different words such as fa'i (banana) and fai (to do), or 'ulu (breadfruit) and ulu (head).
